HEADSTART AT ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY

The University of Adelaide is offering 100 Headstart scholarship places in 2020. The Headstart program is developed for gifted and exceptionally motivated Year 12 students, with the aim of immersing them into university studies and providing a further challenge.



Participants study up to 2 University courses while still in Year 12. Successful completion of the Headstart Scholarship Program contributes to the SACE and ATAR.

Who can apply?

Accelerated Students

 Year 12 students who are accelerated (having completed a Stage 2 subject prior to Year 12). Such students will generally have less than a full year's workload in their final

year, allowing for flexibility in their timetable for university studies.

High Achieving Students

 Year 12 students who are not accelerated, but are high achievers, having met a minimum grade of B across Stage 1 subjects.

The Headstart Scholarship Program is not available to students who have already completed the SACE (i.e. Year 13 students).

Students applying to be part of the Headstart program must be recommended by their school and have the support of their parents/guardians.

They must also be academically able to cope in a fully adult learning environment, as they attend classes on campus, complete assignments and sit examinations, as any other university student would.
