## About Indonesian

The languages of the Indonesian archipelago have been used in Australia since contact several centuries ago between the peoples of the islands now known as Indonesia and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples of northern Australia.

The ties between Australia and Indonesia continue to develop, with an increasing number of Australians travelling to Indonesia for leisure, business and education purposes; numbers of Indonesians visiting Australia are also increasing. Indonesia currently has Australia's largest overseas diplomatic presence.

Indonesian, or *Bahasa Indonesia*, is spoken by approximately 230 million people throughout the Indonesian archipelago. Closely related dialects of the same language, usually called Malay, are used in Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei and southern Thailand.

Indonesian is a standardised language that is the official language of government, education, business and the media. It has been and continues to be shaped by other languages, most significantly Javanese, Dutch, Arabic and English.

Indonesian is written using the Roman alphabet, and there is a clear correlation and a degree of consistency between its sound and its written form. This feature generally makes it easy for speakers of English as a first language to predict how to say, read or write Indonesian words.

## How much does it cost?

The following annual charges apply:

### Government school students

- R-10: \$125
- Years 11-12: \$150
- Years 7-10 International full fee-paying student: \$860\*\*
- Years 11-12 International full fee-paying student: \$950\*\*

### Non-government school students

- R-10: \$125
- Years 11-12: \$150
- Years 7-10 International full fee-paying student: \$1250\*\*
- Years 11-12 Full fee-paying overseas student: \$1350\*\*
